COURSE TITLE: Objectivist Logic

COURSE YEAR AND QUARTER: 2025 Q3-Q4

PREREQUISITE COURSES

200-level courses require that students are enrolled in or have completed the "16-Week Objectivism Seminar" (which has the Fiction course as a prerequisite) or have completed the "Intensive Seminar on Objectivism".

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Ayn Rand embraced Aristotelian logic but developed logic much further. This course covers that "much further": Ayn Rand's original, ground-breaking, and immensely practical discoveries regarding *concepts*—their formation, use and misuse. The course not only presents and "chews" the theory, it also provides training in the *method* of thinking that made Ayn Rand... Ayn Rand.

COURSE DURATION: 16 weeks

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- consciously bring to bear new or previously unidentified methods of cognition
- defend the absolutism of logic against all attacks and subversions
- recognize and quarantine invalid concepts
- use three methods to combat "floating abstractions"
- define any term
- know how to "think in principles"
